#### **Selectboard Minutes**

May 14, 2019 Warren Selectboard Warren Municipal Balding 7:00 PM

**Members Present**: Andrew Cunningham, Chair, Bob Ackland, Vice Chair, Luke Youmell, Randy Graves & Camilla Behn.

**Others Present**: Rosemarie White, Brian Fleisher, Jonathan Clough, Dayna Lisaius, Perry Bigelow, TV 44/45, Katy (VR) (any others)?????

**7:00 Public Comment – Lincoln Gap Road** – Mr. Bigelow inquired about seeing the saw cutting of the pavement on Lincoln Gap road above West Hill. Mr. Cunningham commented that the crew is starting to line up replacing culverts prior to paving and the work would be starting soon. He did ask about road closures and Mr. Cunningham commented that he did not anticipate any road closures.

7:05 PM – Brian Fleisher-Expressing Awareness & Concerns of Plans Moving Harwood Middle School to Waterbury –Mr. Fleisher presented to the board a copy of possible school configuration. The board felt more forums would help to keep the public informed. His concerns starting with superintendents, white paper 2017 was moving the 5-8 from Valley towns to Crossett brook and closing two Valley schools. It greatly effects economic resources and Valley vitality and end up with two schools K-4 closing two of the Valley schools. Classes 5-8 would go to Crossett Brook. These options are being considered by the board with voting on issue possibly in June or September of this coming year. There are currently Equity opportunities and school choice. The 7-8 Harwood school would go to Crossett Brook without any major improvements. They did not consider busing, teachers, and other costs. Mr. Fleisher's point is for boards to get engaged now and pay attention on what's going on. The vitality of the Valley schools brings in people to live in the Valley and with only two schools with grades from K-4, these people coming in will look at other places to live. Mr. Ackland asked if anyone had looked at the major decision making is the board is looking at the economic impacts to the communities. The planning District knows from an economic 2014 study that the 3 schools were economic drivers to put people into this communities because of the schools. Ms. White commented that this has not been discussed as it is all brain storming to get some options on paper. There has been no research on these issues. Mr. Cunningham commented that there is a public outreach scheduled in Warren but the Representatives did not know the date. Mr. Clough commented that there is a process timeline in place to make decisions. The board will be voting on criteria options and coming up with final options moving at a slow and deliverable pace because there is no vote until next March. The board has been frustrated on the bond as there are questions on the Valley Schools and what is going to happen do, they need to bond for as much. Mr. Cunningham commented that the representatives are asking for people to come to these meeting and get involved with the process. Mr. Ackland asked can anyone answer why the Harwood enrollment is down 25% and the middle School down 12% and the Valley 3%? Ms. White commented that there is duel enrollment, early college seniors that are not included in the per pupil, competition from other schools with better facilities and programs. The Harwood district does not have any programs for the non-college bound essential trades children. Mr. Clough commented the board is keeping an open mind on all the scenarios. The board thanked the representatives coming and encourage people to look at the Unified Districts website for the meetings and information.

**Local Emergency Management Plan** – Mr. Campbell brought the corrected page of the contact information page for the board to sign. The LEMP was approved at the last Selectboard meeting.

Ms. Lisaius commented she would find out.

#### Ladies and Gentlemen:

Mad River Solar VT 1, LLC ("MRS") is pleased to inform you of plans to construct an approximately 150 kW (AC) net-metering solar project on a gravel parking lot (considered "Lot F") at 1840 Sugarbush Access Road in Warren, Vermont (the "Project"). The Project requires a certificate of public good from the Public Utility Commission ("Commission" or "PUC") pursuant to Sections 248 and 8010 of Title 30, Vermont Statutes Annotated. This letter provides you with advance notice, as required under the Commission's rules, that MRS intends to file a petition for a certificate of public good with the Commission on or after June 18, 2019 (the "Petition").

This letter together with the attached site plan describe the Project's benefits, design, and potential impacts, as well as your opportunities to participate in the Commission's review process. #### **Project Benefits and Description**

<u>Purpose</u>. The purpose of the Project is to generate clean, renewable energy for the benefit of Summit Ventures NE, LLC, d/b/a Sugarbush Resort ("Sugarbush"). As a net-metering system, the Project will provide Sugarbush Resort with a long-term energy source at discounted prices. The Project will also benefit the broader Vermont economy in other ways: by the payment of municipal and education taxes; by employing Vermont businesses for the development work; and, where commercially feasible, by purchasing Project equipment from Vermont companies and employing Vermont businesses for construction, installation, and maintenance work.

Environmental Benefits. The Project will also result in meaningful environmental benefits. The renewable energy credits or RECs associated with the Project's output will be transferred to the interconnecting utility and retired to meet Vermont's renewable energy requirements and climate change goals. In its daily operation, the Project will produce no emissions, and thus will help in a small but measurable way to reduce CO<sub>2</sub> emissions associated with global climate change.

<u>Features</u>. As shown on the attached site plan (<u>Attachment 1</u>), the Project will be located along the edge of an existing parking lot owned by Sugarbush. The proposed site plan depicts the configuration of the solar array, related electrical equipment, and point of access. The Project's preliminary site plan was designed in consultation with Sugarbush to maintain appropriate separation or screening from surrounding land uses, minimize the Project footprint, maximize solar exposure, and limit impacts on the natural and built environments.

#### **Impact Assessment**

MRS has employed a team of engineers, environmental and landscape consultants, and energy advisors with substantial experience with solar projects in Vermont. Based upon their assessment of conditions at this site, as well as work on other similar solar projects, the Project has been planned so that it will not cause undue adverse impacts to any sensitive or protected built or environmental resources, to public health and safety, or to the scenic or natural beauty of the area.

Low-Impact Design. The Project incorporates low-impact design characteristics including:

- Racking located alongside an existing parking lot to limit new disturbance required for the Project and maximize screening from the existing vegetative buffer along Sugarbush Access Road.
- No new impervious surface is proposed for the Project.
- Project activities and equipment will avoid all wetlands and associated wetland buffers.
- Limited vegetative clearing will be required.
- During construction, stormwater best management practices will be implemented in accordance with the ANR guidelines.
- Daily access to the array is not required, as the Project production will be monitored remotely, with technicians dispatched to the site only on an as-needed basis.
- The Project will meet the safety standards of the National Electrical Safety Code, the National Electric Code, as well as utility interconnection standards for safe and reliable operation of solar electric plants.
- The Project will not require any special municipal services and thus will not impose undue burdens on fire, police, or water/sewer services.

<u>Collateral Permits</u>. Based on the Project team's preliminary review, we anticipate that the Project will not need any collateral permits. However, if it becomes necessary to obtain any such permits, the process will be undertaken with the proper authorities for such permits.

<u>Electrical</u>. An interconnection application is being submitted to GMP. The utility will complete its analysis for the Project to determine the necessary steps and potential upgrades to safely interconnect the Project with the distribution system.

<u>Aesthetics</u>. A complete visual assessment will be conducted, but initial findings are that the Project is well sited and will have limited if any visibility from offsite vantage points, in part due to the existing vegetative buffer that will shield views from Sugarbush Access Road. For this reason, MRS does not anticipate that additional aesthetic mitigation measures contemplated under Commission Rule 5.800 will be required for the proposed Project. A full aesthetics analysis will be included with the Petition.

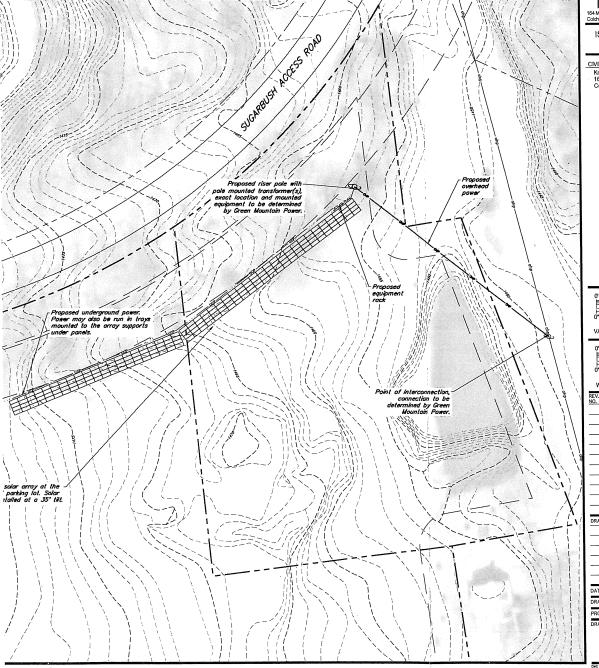
