#### **Selectboard Minutes**

May 25, 2021 Warren Selectboard VIA Zoom 6:00 PM

Members Present: Andrew Cunningham, Chair, Luke Youmell, Vice Chair, Bob Ackland & Camilla Behn.

Others Present: Devin Klein Corrigan, Jeff Campbell, Susan Klein, Perry Bigelow, Chris Seiler, MRVT, Hadley Laskowski.

6:00 PM - Public Comment - None

6:05 PM — Interview with Devin Klein Corrigan for Appointment on Selectboard - Ms. Klein Corrigan had interview with the board last year for a vacancy but it was not the right fit at the time. Ms. Klein Corrigan is a resident of Warren and with her husband own a business together. She was appointed to the Warren DRB in April of 2019. Ms. Behn commented that she is pulling information together for Ms. Klein Corrigan regarding what Selectboard members duties are to help guide her.

Motion by Mr. Cunningham to approve the Selectboard appointment vacancy of Devin Klein Corrigan to fill the Selectboard vacancy vacated by Mr. Graves for the remainder of this current year, second by Mr. Ackland. All in Favor: VOTE: 4-0.

**6:10 PM – Covid Update** – Jeff Campbell – Report attached.

6:25 PM - Continued Discussion - Office Hours/ Selectboard in Person Meetings, Masks - Mr. Youmell had spoken to Sugarbush, Paradise Deli and the East Warren Market regarding the Mask Mandate. The two stores are going continue to have their employees wear masks and will update their policies to state that masks are required for those not vaccinated. Sugarbush is pretty much shut down for the season. Their employees are still wearing masks in vehicles when people are riding together. They have about 75 people working now mostly outside. They have been following state and/or local guidance whichever one is stricter. Mr. Youmell commented that businesses are enforcing on their own on the Mask Mandate. Mr. Campbell stated that the State guidelines state: any buildings such as schools, hospitals, correction facilities, nursing facilities and heath facilities are requiring masks. He commented that town government can request mask facial coverings in public buildings with no mask facial covering mandated outside. Mr. Cunningham, commented that he is not ready to lift the mandated mask notice until he hears from the town employees and the Library. Ms. Behn commented that the board could require masks facial coverings in the town office requiring the public to wear one and the employees wear their masks when the public is in the building. Mr. Campbell commented that the notice that was approved by the Selectboard has no set end date and that the board would have to amend the notice. Ms. Behn commented that business could chose what is best for them and their employees. The board agreed to wait until the June 8th meeting and Mr. Campbell will draft up an amendment.

7:45 PM -July 4<sup>th</sup> Permit Amendment – Ms. Klein came before the board to proceed as normal given the guidance that the Governor plans on lifting all restrictions by July 4, 2021. Ms. Klein commented that it will be very low key and that there will be no Brooksfield activities, no gate keepers and no buses will be running due to the guidelines. She commented that she would publicize the event and encourage all recommend safety protocols including wearing masks and social distancing following the CDC guidelines. The owner of the Pitcher Inn and Warren Store are still planning on doing the street dance.

Ms. Klein also commented that she has new sponsors that have stepped up and that the costs will be contained within the budgeted amount. Ms. Klein commented she could have on line donation or Mr. Cunningham commented that there could be a donation station set up. The biggest issues are traffic flow for the event. Ms. Klein would like to set up a meeting with the sheriff, Constables and Mr. Poulin to meet on site and look at this issue. Ms. Klein commented that Main Street from RT 100 will be closed to inbound starting at 8:30 will traffic going up Brook Road for parking at Brooksfield. Traffic could exit north bound via East Warren Road or Plunkton. Traffic going south bound could exit onto Flat Iron Rd and go south on Main Street to RT 100. She is asking who on the Selectboard has availability for a June 4 meeting to meet on site. Mr. Campbell and Mr. Youmell will meet with Ms. Klein along with Mr. Poulin and a representative from the Washington County Sherriff's office.

Mr. Cunningham asked what is the theme of the event this year? Ms. Klein commented "Hero's Among Us" honoring all the essential workers. Ms. Behn would like to go on record stating she is not comfortable or excited about the event. Her concerns were not knowing who is vaccinated and who is not, where are they coming from to the parade and that the group of 20–30-year-olds are still lingering behind in getting shots. She did not want to be accountable for an outbreak in the Mad River Area resulting from the parade. Mr. Ackland commented that he is on the fence wondering if we are there yet ahead of the pandemic. Mr. Youmell commented that he is in favor of the event encouraging all the safety protocols. Mr. Cunningham commented that he feels comfortable with having the event letting the public know all the risks. Ms. Klein Corrigan commented that there is a really low outside transition rate about .1% and also felt comfortable with the event. Mr. Cunningham commented that this is a time sensitive event and that Ms. Klein needed approval to have time to put the event to put together the logistics for the event.

Motion by Mr. Ackland to remove the provisional from the 4<sup>th</sup> of July festival permit, second by Mr. Youmell. All in Favor: VOTE: 5-0.

#### 7:10 Other Business

Constable Issue with Waitsfield - Mr. Cunningham commented that Waitsfield has reached out to Warren on sharing a Constable. Mr. Ackland commented that Mr. Campbell could work as a private contractor for Waitsfield or Waitsfield could contract with Warren on hours. Mr. Campbell commented that he has answered questions from the Town Administrator and the Chair of the Waitsfield board in regards to budget, training, equipment etc. Mr. Campbell stated that his first loyalty is with the Town of Warren. He commented that he told them he would not do any traffic enforcement and it would be the same duties as he is serving in Warren. Mr. Campbell didn't see that there would be an issue of him serving both communities. Warren has invested a lot of time and money into the certification training. Waitsfield took Warren's budget and reduced in half for one Constable and Mr. Campbell stated that Waitsfield would have to pay for the insurance liability as Warren does. Mr. Cunningham asked, is it an hourly contract or is a budgeted amount? Mr. Campbell stated he puts in about 30 hours and if he got overwhelmed, he would step down from Waitsfield duties. Mr. Cunningham wondered if there would be a line item in the Waitsfield Budget for this or maybe an MOU? Waitsfield could pay the training for a few years was another comment that was made by Mr. Ackland. The yearly training hours is a question of how to handle it. Does Waitsfield pay 1/2, or contract hourly? Mr. Ackland commented that Warren would need to get a return on the investment.

Mr. Cunningham commented that there needs to be more discussion with Waitsfield. The board wanted to see what comes next from Waitsfield.

Crack Sealing of Town Roads — The board was presented with a proposal for crack sealing paved roads. The vendor did not recommend sealing the roads that were up for paving this year as they had lost their life profile. Mr. Ackland commented that Mr. Bretton Gardner from Pike Industries recommended sealing them prior to paving the Dump Road, Airport Road from RT 100 and the Roxbury Mt. Road. The proposal included the other town roads as well. Mr. Cunningham commented that there seems to be a difference of opinion between the contractors. It was left that Mr. Ackland and Mr. Bombard would contact the crack sealing vendor and ask why his opinion was different that Pike Industries. There was no decision to move ahead on any crack sealing at this time.

**8:10 PM – Approve Town Permit for Roots Juice Truck** – The board had given permission last year for the juice truck to be located at the East Warren Community Market.

Motion by Mr. Youmell to approve the Roots Juice Truck from June 1-Octoober 11, to set up on the Town land at the East Warren Community Market site, second by Mr. Ackland. All in Favor: VOTE: 5-0.








Rate of Vermonters with COVID-19 by Town in the Last Two Weeks



# Update on outbreaks and clusters as of May 19, 2021

- 31 Active outbreaks, 31 Primary and 0 Secondary, 473 outbreaks have been resolved.
- There have been 852 cases among residents and 425 cases among the facility staff in Congregate Care & Living since last March, with an increase 32 residents and 5 staff member in the past 2 weeks
- There have been 1,704 cases among children and staff in Schools & Child Care since last March


## **Testing**

## Vaccination Planning


- The governor says that once the State reaches 80% he will lift all remaining restrictions that day.
- CVMC is hosting a COVID Vaccine Hub for Walk-ins May 24-28 between 8-Noon and 1-3 in Berlin
- About 423,500 have been vaccinated in VT. 332,200 have completed their doses
- The goal continues to have everyone in VT vaccinated by July 4<sup>th</sup>.
- More than 163,900,000 have received 1 doses so far nationwide, 130,600,000 have received 2 doses
- Nearly 359,000,000 doses have been distributed nationwide
- Over 1.7 Billion doses have been administered worldwide



## **Vermont Vaccination Progress**


By Age Band






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Age Groups of People with at least One Dose Administered:

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


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Sex of People with at least One Dose Administered.
