Members Present: Andrew Cunningham, Chair, Luke Youmell, Bob Ackland, Camilla Behn & Devin Klein Corrigan.

6:30 PM - Public Comment - None.

6:35 PM - VHB Village Traffic & parking Summary of Results - Next Steps - Selectboard - Mr. Ackland wanted to convey that since the Town of Warren has renewed its Village Designation that it is eligible for a very large pot of money coming to Village Designation Centers that have the Village Designation. This money is only for those who have this designation can apply for projects to enhance their village centers. The grant deadline is in March. Mr. Ackland commented that he thought the traffic medians and the cobblestone crosswalks were good idea's that he supported. He also stated that the striping work is good during the months that there is no snow, but not characteristic of the Village. Mr. Youmell commented that he would like to see the shoulders of the roads narrowed instead of the traffic medians. Ms. Behn commented that she would like to see further investigation on the traffic medians as they could be potentially dangerous depending on design especially at the upper Brook Road section by Dump Road. Ms. Klein Corrigan commented that the cobble stone cross walks provide continuity and physical appearance for vehicles to slow down. Mr. Sanford commented that putting stuff in the roadway is a good way to slow people down but was not sure if it can be done on a much larger scale of the area. He thought narrowing the roads was a good solution and the medians, but not sure how they would work for the winter. He also thought adding lights on the bridge was good but the traffic circle was a definite no go. Mr. Czaplinski commented that rumble strips were good, but did not like the traffic medians and then there is the maintenance of the end result of all the implemented items. Mr. Bifano commented that rumble strips are very noisy and the sound travels. He also commented that whether you narrow the roads or not, people are still going to drive the same speed until they meet on coming vehicles. Adding bike lanes don't work as people drive in them. Mr. Graves commented that everything works that has been presented and talked about has precedents. Mr. Cunningham commented that he would like see large planters place within the roadway area's that can be removed in the winter. The board then went down the list of what they thought were good ideas. A copy of the VHB Report attached.

Short Term: Main Street/ Brook Road Intersection: Remove Asphalt to reduce turning Radius.

Brook Road Pedestrian Enhancements (Main Street to School Road): Re-stripe with 10' Lanes & 3+ shoulder with marked crosswalks at Flat Iron Rd.

Mid Term:

Warren Elementary Trailhead & Crossing Improvements: Develop distinctive markings of features to help identify the trailhead. Add striped or cobble stone cross walk in-street pedestrian crossing.

Ms. Behn commented that the Planning Commission is looking on how to prioritize these items and are looking for the Selectboard to weigh in on the priorities. Mr. Sanford commented that the first two priorities are to completed the new Land Use Development Regulations, the VHB Village Traffic Calming/Parking plan and the Town Garage. The Planning Commission will also be coming in more often to update the board on their work and to improve communications. Mr. Sanford commented that the first Public Land Development Regulations Hearing is March 14, 6:00 PM at the Warren Town Hall.

8:05 PM – Posting of Weight Limits for Town Highways – Mr. Cunningham brought up for Mr. Bombard to the board the question on posting Town Highways for spring weight limits. According to Mr. Bombard he did not feel that it was necessary as all the roads are posted at 24,000 pounds the state limit. The board agreed not to do the spring posting of Town Highways.

8:06 PM – Michelle Bennett's Roaming Dogs Complaint – Ms. Bennett's dogs are a nuisance in the neighborhood as they are running at large again. The Board met with Ms. Bennett back in July and gave her suggestions on how she can control her dogs. She had agreed with the board that she would try to contain her dogs from roaming the neighborhood. Mr. Bifano commented that the board can issue a fine up to \$500 to Ms. Bennett for not complying with the Dog Ordinance and board's suggestions. The board asked Mr. Bifano, Dog Warden, to write a letter stating the repercussions of what can happen if she does not comply. Ms. Klein Corrigan, requested to see the letter prior to Mr. Bifano sending.




